School's First Day of School (2016) By Adam Rex (author) and Christian Robinson (illustrator)



They soon discover that sometimes being scared isn't as "scary" as they thought. With expressive illustrations and simple text, this giggle-inducing tale about (*not*) being scared features the endearing characters from the Theodor Seuss Geisel Award- winner *You Are* (*Not*) *Small*.




Hattie & Hudson (2017) By Chris Van Dusen

Hattie McFadden is a born explorer. Every morning she grabs her life jacket and paddles out in her canoe to discover something new on the lake, singing a little song on her way. When her singing draws up from the depths a huge mysterious beast, everyone in town is terrified — except Hattie, who looks into the creature's friendly, curious eyes and knows that this is no monster. So Hattie sneaks out at night to see the giant — whom she names Hudson — and the two become friends. But how can she make the frightened, hostile townspeople see that Hudson isn't scary or dangerous at all?



S is for S'mores: A Camping Alphabet (2017) By Helen Foster James (author) and Lita Judge (illustrator)

Next to Dawgs baseball and The STampede nothing says summer quite like a camping trip. From what to pack, where to go, and what to do when you get there, S is for Smores: A Camping Alphabet takes readers on an A-Z trail exploring this outdoor pastime.



Dad and the Dinosaur (2017) By Gennifer Choldenko (author) and Dan Santat (illustrator)

Nicholas wants to be as brave as his dad, but he needs help. That's why he needs a dinosaur. After all, dinosaurs like the dark, bugs are nothing to them, and they eat manhole covers for lunch (and everything under them for dinner).

With his toy dinosaur, Nicholas can scale tall walls, swim in deep water, even score a goal against the huge goalie everyone calls Gorilla. But when the dinosaur goes missing, everything is scary again.

Luckily, his dad knows that even the bravest people can get scared, and it's okay to ask for help facing your fears. It's just guy stuff.



Yes, it seems there is no escaping the drudgery of your daily grind, whatever it might be. Or perhaps we've just learned that grumps are everywhere. . . .




Muddle & Mo (2017) By Nikki Slade Robinson

Boasting bright and hilarious photographs, along with a story written from the point of view of an older, wiser sibling, Refe and Susan Tuma's picture book documents a very messy adventure that shows just what the dinosaurs did last night.





Nanette's Baquette (2016) By Mo Willems

Mo Willems' hilarious new picture book, Nanette's Baquette, follows our plucky heroine on her first big solo trip to the bakery. But . . . will Nanette get the baguette from baker Juliette? Or will Nanette soon be beset with regret?

Are You a Horse (2009) By Andy Rash

For his birthday, Roy's friends give him a saddle and some very specific instructions: 1. Find a horse. 2. Enjoy the ride!

Roy has never met a horse, but he's game to try: A snake tells him to look for a creature with legs. A crab has six legs, but he's too unfriendly to be a horse. A friendly chameleon smiles at Roy, but horses don't change colour.... What's a horseless cowboy to do?



Frog on a Log (2015) By Kes Gray

"It's very simple, really. Cats sit on mats, hares sit on chairs, mules sit on stools, gophers sit on sofas, and frogs sit on logs."

Each animal's designated seat rhymes with that animal's name. "It's not about being comfortable," explains the cat. "It's about doing the right thing."



Up, Tall and High (2012) By Ethan Long

In three laugh-out-loud situations, an irresistible cast of colorful birds illustrate the concepts of "up," "tall" and "high." First, a short peacock proves that he may not be tall, but he definitely isn't small. Then, a resourceful bird helps his penguin friend find a way to fly. Finally, two birds want to live in the same tree, but what goes up must come down! Each short story features a flap that reveals a surprise twist. With fun fold-outs, easy-toread text, and a hilarious cast of characters, these stories beg emerging readers to act them out again and again

Not Norman: A Goldfish Story (2015) By Kelly Bennett and Noah Z. Jones

Norman the goldfish isn't what this little boy had in mind. He wanted a different kind of pet — one that could run and catch, or chase string and climb trees, a soft furry pet to sleep on his bed at night. Definitely not Norman. But when he tries to trade Norman for a "good pet," things don't go as he planned. Could it be that Norman is a better pet than he thought? With wry humor and lighthearted affection, author Kelly Bennett and illustrator Noah Z. Jones tell an unexpected — and positively fishy — tale about finding the good in



something you didn't know you wanted.



How to Babysit a Grandma (2015) By Jean Reagan and Lee Wildish

When you babysit a grandma, if you're lucky . . . it's a sleepover at her house! And with the useful tips found in this book, you're guaranteed to become an expert grandma-sitter in no time. Every kind of bird and beast has to sleep, from the monkeys in the jungle to the whales in the ocean to the ants under the ground... but not Fred. His to-do list is far too long! Armed with plenty of imagination, this determined little boy and his attempts to resist bedtime are sure to strike a chord with today's over scheduled families. Drowsy animals of all stripes look on in disbelief as Fred keeps on going and going and going, until . . . Could it be that, after so much activity, even Fred needs to rest? *Shhh.* Close the book softly, and *please* let Fred sleep.




Dinosaur vs. Bedtime (2011) By Bob Shea

With spare text and irresistible dinosaur roaaars, little dinosaurs will be begging for this book to be read again and again. The sturdy board book format is ideal for strong-minded toddlers. Too Tall Houses (2012) By Gianna Marino

Good friends learn a small but important lesson. Owl and Rabbit are good friends and live in two small houses next to each other. They are perfectly happy . . . until Rabbit's garden gets in the way of Owl's view. So Owl builds his house a little taller. Only that blocks the sun from Rabbit's vegetables. So Rabbit builds *his* house taller. And soon it's a housebuilding frenzy and the two now not-so-good friends have the two tallest houses in the world!



Eeny, Meeny, Miney, Mo and Flo (2015) By Lauren Molk




That is Not a Good Idea (2013) By Mo Willems


How Many Jelly Beans? (2012) By Andrea Menotti & Yancey Labat

The Book With No Pictures


The Book With No Pictures (2014) By B.J. Novak

You might think a book with no pictures seems boring and serious. Except . . . here's how books work. Everything written on the page *has* to be said by the person reading it aloud. Even if the words say . . .BLORK. Or BLUURF. Even if the words are a preposterous song about eating ants for breakfast, or just a list of astonishingly goofy sounds like BLAGGITY BLAGGITY and GLIBBITY GLOBBITY. Cleverly irreverent and irresistibly silly, *The Book with No Pictures* is one that kids will beg to hear again and again. (And parents will be happy to oblige.)



Only One You (2006) By Linda Kranz

There's only one you in this great big world. Make it a better place. Adri's mama and papa share some of the wisdom they have gained through the years with their eager son. Their words, simple and powerful, are meant to comfort and guide him as he goes about exploring the world. This exquisitely illustrated book explodes with color and honest insights.



Welcome to the Neighbourwood (2015) By Shawn Sheehy

At the edge of the forest a spider spins her web, while nearby, a hummingbird uses strands of spider silk to build her nest. These are just two of the many animals who live side by side, sharing the resources they need to construct homes, traps, or places to store food.



A Nest is Noisy (2015) By Dianna Hutts Aston

From tiny bee hummingbird nests to orangutan nests high in the rainforest canopy, an incredible variety of nests are showcased here in all their splendor. Poetic in voice and elegant in design, this carefully researched book introduces children to a captivating array of nest facts and will spark the imaginations of children whether in a classroom reading circle or on a parent's lap.
